



Informal Talk and Discussion with Dr. Evelyn Pinkerton Pioneer and Expert in Co-management

Dr. Pinkerton will reflect on her more than 20 years' worth of engagement with co-management research and initiatives in British Columbia. She will open the discussion with a brief presentation on some of her **"Reflections and Thoughts on Co-Management: Opportunities, Risks and Challenges"**



Dr. Evelyn Pinkerton is a maritime anthropologist who has integrated common property theory and cultural/political ecology to consider the role communities play in the management of adjacent renewable natural resources. She has played a key role in developing the theory and practice of powersharing and stewardship through co-management agreements. She is editor of *Cooperative Management of Local Fisheries* (1989) and has published over 30 peer-reviewed articles on fisheries and forestry. In *Fisheries that Work* (1995, coauthored with Martin Weinstein), she began to develop a more comprehensive framework for analyzing and comparing co-management arrangements by scope of rights, scale of agreement, level of authority, and degree of formality. This work has since evolved into analysis of the developmental sequence of types of co-management rights and activities, and has focused additionally on the role of senior governments in co-management agreements.
