Fisheries management has been described as a 'wicked problem'. Barb Neis will use findings from research by multiple researchers, graduate students, interns and community partners participating in the CURRA five-year program of community-engaged research to talk about why rebuilding collapsed fisheries and threatened communities is a particularly wicked problem. She will also talk about the lessons learned from the CURRA initiatives about potential strategies and tools for addressing this particularly wicked problem in west coast NL fisheries and elsewhere.
