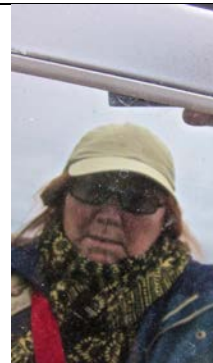

Pierre LeBlanc: Fish Plants 2006-2012. "The genesis of this work was, in part, my desire to work within the confines of a particular photographic tradition. This work aims at looking at the fish plant within a rational photographic practice; not as a nostalgic document but rather as a state of affairs. What do we learn when we observe?"



Pam Hall is creating an "Encyclopedia of Local Knowledge" with more than 80 collaborators on NL's west coast. In a moment of environmental and social crisis in many communities, she is working to mobilize local voices to include them in meaningful dialogues about future-building and to demonstrate the contributions that art might make towards a restorative sustainability.
